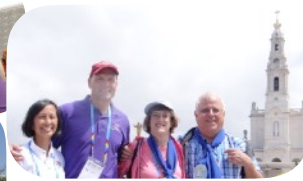
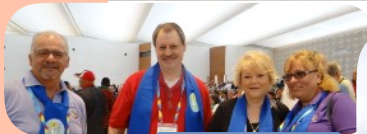

We have immense gratitude and admiration for all the planning and work that went into our International Gathering at Fatima! 23 from our own Northwestern Region, 200 from the USA, and approximately 9,000 folks from 80 countries around the world gathered in the the Basilica of the Most Holy Trinity each day for morning prayer, meditation, slide shows, testimonies, talks and Mass. Other activities held outside the Basilica included a Musical based on true stories of conversion at Fatima, the path of Valinhos where the apparitions took place, an Exhibition with booths representing a variety of countries, ie, SuperRegions, rosary and candlelight procession and the Sit-down, both held on the Sanctuary grounds, with the Closing Ceremony and Mass held also on the Sanctuary grounds in front of the Basilica of Our Lady of the Rosary. This pilgrimage was at least 2 years in the making, with dozens of couples attentive to the many details so that we may all have a memorable event.

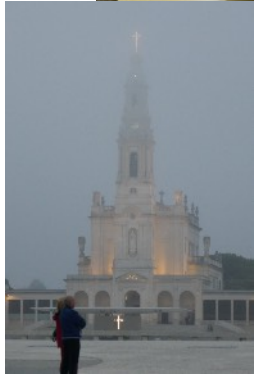
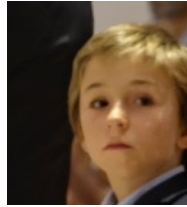
We were warmly welcomed at our arrival in the Porto Airport, then taken by bus on an hour drive to Fatima. Once in our hotels each couple was given a packet with our name tags and information, all well organized to keep us all on track for each day. Our meals were served in our hotels, with breakfast at 7 am, sharing food with couples and priests, (in our case, from Brazil, France, Portugal). We would then meet in the Basilica of the Most Holy Trinity. Each day a different SuperRegion would lead the prayer, followed by Meditation focused on the scripture of the day, a couple of well put together slideshows, testimonies and talks. Every person had headphones for the translations into our own language. There would be daily Mass, and group activity as indicated on our schedule (we were all assigned to a group: A, B, C, D). Our team couples came from Brazil, France, and Cameroon.



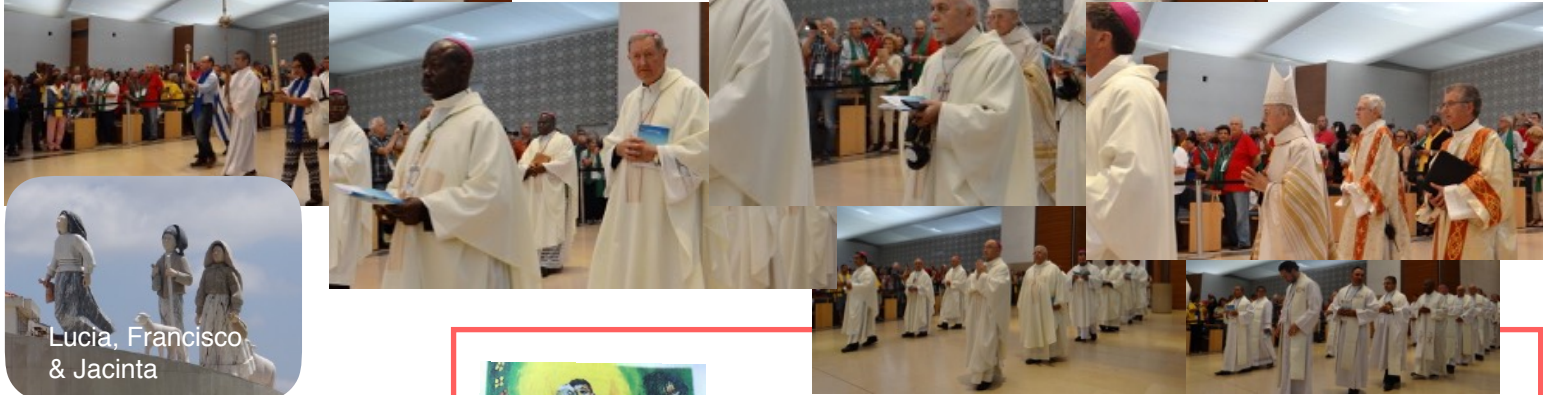

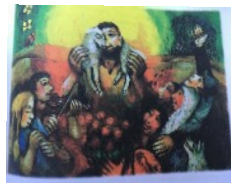

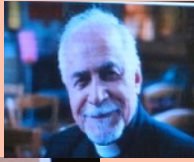

Have you forgiven them?

That was the final question that a journalist from Reunion asked me in an interview in February 2017, referring to my kidnapping by terrorists in Mosul in 2005. I answered him spontaneously: "Yes, straight away." - "How?" - "First of all, because we are disciples of Jesus, then because we do not solve the problem by not forgiving, and I would become complicit in it and full of hatred all my life."

This is a lesson I learned from my kidnapping, one afternoon in January 2005, when two gunmen pushed me into the trunk of their car for an unknown destination. I spent the night in a cold room, lying on the floor, hands and feet bound, blindfolded. Before closing my mouth with a bandage, my jailer asked me how much money I had in my wallet, which he had confiscated earlier. I told him that there were some \$300 for the poor. "What poor", he said to me, "you, you will be slaughtered!" I answered him quietly: "Then, you will distribute it in my place"! I spent the night praying, remembering the psalm that we recite at the offertory of the Syriac Mass: "Like a lamb led to the slaughter ...", and repeating the prayer of abandonment of Father Charles de Foucauld.

The next day, transferring me to another place, the kidnappers tried to intimidate me, but for me it was truly an execution walk, when the one who was keeping an eye on me put the knife under my neck, invoking "the name of God" to slaughter me, and saying to me, "Speak, if you have anything to say to your parents before the execution". I took his word as verdict, and said distinctly: "I offer my life for peace in Iraq, that her children, Christians and Muslims, may join hands in building this country." - "That's not what I want ...do you want to say a word to them?" he said to me. - "I have nothing else to say," I replied ... Then he withdrew his knife, exclaiming suddenly: "By Allah, these are good words," and the conversation took another tone. This confident abandonment, this invitation to solidarity between Muslims and Christians, was another lesson of my kidnapping. It gave me inner peace and the strength to *sustain me in the vital dialogue with Muslims*. A discussion ensued on traditional doctrinal disputes between Islam and Christianity (the divinity of Christ, the divine sonship of Jesus, the marriage of priests, the sense of gift ...). The visit of one they call their "Emir Prince" put an end to my captivity, and after a little discussion, he ordered my release against a heavy ransom. I was the first cleric to be kidnapped. The worst could have happened, as was the case for my brother Bishop Faraj Rahho, a Chaldean Catholic Bishop of Mosul, kidnapped and murdered in 2008.

Compassion in the Team

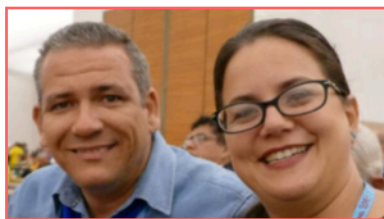
Together with our Team members we belong to the Altamura 1 Team. We have been in Teams since 1989. Our friends, Vincenzo and Chiara joined in 2007. From the beginning our greatest desire was to get to know God through love for others. Since Chiara and Vincenzo came into our lives, love has come to us and has lived in us in a new way. Vincenzo and Chiara arrived at a time when we were in need of something new and they brought with them their story of great suffering. From the beginning it seemed as though they had always been members of our team. At the meetings, prayer took on a greater role, and with Chiara's illness, it intensified and gave life to our weekly saying of the rosary. I am Vincenzo, I am 50 years old, I work in administration. I live with my son, Nicola, who is 14, and with my mother-in-law, Tina, since my wife, Chiara, died. At the beginning of our love story, we lived far apart because of work. We relied on each other and trusted in each other. In December, 2002, after only two and a half years of marriage, an accident left me in a wheelchair. You can imagine how shaken our lives were. Our hopes were destroyed and our love extinguished. Faced with suffering, faith weakens, it is shaken and rage erupts. We were in pieces and we did not know how to face it all. It would have been easy to run from all the suffering....In the autumn of 2006, my uncle Lorenzo and aunt Laura, members of Teams in Rome, suggested we join the Altamura 1 Team. The warm welcome by all the Team members again revealed the mercy of God towards us. ...Reassured that we had already received our quota of suffering from life, we thought we had reached an equilibrium and tranquillity. Instead, like a lightning strike from the sky, in April 2012 Chiara discovered a malignant tumour. Night engulfed us again. Chiara felt she had no future. The International Gathering of Teams of Our Lady in Fatima – A Personal Reflection

Dear Reader, this will not be a summary of the events and speeches of the International Gathering in Fatima. There are very comprehensive summaries available to you. I highly recommend the daily journal by Chris and Paul Sanchez referenced on Page 1 of this NW Newsletter. No, this here is a personal reflection on how this gathering has changed me, has changed my understanding of the Movement, has changed my belief in the Movement, and most importantly, has changed the path of my Faith.

Of course, the international gathering was perfectly organized, with an outstanding, although very intense, program. Every day starts at 7am with breakfast in your hotel, runs through the day with very little leisure time, and usually ends by 11pm. I'll come back to the program later. For me, more important than most of the speeches were the people gathered here. Their stories, their past, and their vocation. We witnessed some amazing stories from extraordinary people.

At the basis of your stay is your house and the couples in it. Well, the house is the hotel the organizers assigned to you and other couples, not totally random, but intentionally international. They took care that there is a common language, sometimes through translators, like in my case. Thanks Ana! We ended up in a hotel with chiefly Spanish or Portuguese speaking couples and priests. Spanish and Portuguese, in case you do not know, are closely related so that one can understand what the other one is saying. Besides me, there was one other couple who were not native speakers of either language. Over the course of the week, these 30 couples and four priests become our family. You share your stories and they share theirs. You get to know them well, language barrier or not. One of these stories is about a widow in our house, who did not want to come alone to the gathering. She has been in teams for many years and together with her husband, was very involved in the early growth of the movement. But now, widowed, she was not sure she wanted to come. Friends from her team convinced her. She would have missed something that she, for sure, will not forget for the rest of her life. At the gathering, she met teams from Costa Rica. They remembered her! They were thrilled meeting her! Many, many years ago, she and her husband were piloting the very first team in Costa Rica all the way from Spain. She was so happy to learn that teams in Costa Rica are thriving with 5 sectors and about 50 teams, seeing with her own eyes the fruits of her labor. The Costa Rica teams went through the troubles of finding and very gratefully presenting to her a photo of the first piloted team, showing her and her husband in Costa Rica. How amazing.



Another, shorter story for which we have room here is about the one couple attending from Cuba, a country which was recently piloted from Mexico. Seeing teams taking root in a country in which religion was banned for two generations is something you can only wonder about. Similarly, teams are still very present in the Middle East, like in Syria, besides severe economic hardship, war, and prosecution in this region of the world. One can only marvel how this is still possible. A glimpse of an answer can be found in the very emotional speech of Mgr Basilios Georges Casmoussa, formerly Archbishop of Mosul, Iraq, who was abducted in Iraq, but entered a religious dialog with his kidnappers, who eventually released him because of his Faith.

Through these and other stories, I came to believe in that week in Fatima, that our Movement, the Movement of Teams of Our Lady, and the people carrying the Movement, are truly and undeniably blessed.

I also learned that the Movement is much, much bigger than I thought. Yes, I read the numbers on how many teams there are in each country and the world, how the numbers grew over time etc. But experiencing it is quite something different. The cathedral in Fatima, which also served as our conference center, provides room for about 9000 people. We used every single chair. The notable part here is how much the church supports Teams of Our Lady. The number of cardinals, archbishops, bishops, and priest attending the gathering is nothing short of remarkable. To give a few examples: Archbishop Tolentino de Mendonça presented each day a meditation on the topic of the gathering, the Gospel parable of the "Prodigal Son"; the homily of the Mass on July 19th was given by Monsignor Éric de Moulins-Beaufort, Auxiliary Bishop of Paris; the homily of the Mass on July 20th was given by Cardinal Sergio da Rocha, Archbishop of Brasília, president of the Brazilian National Conference of Bishops; and the homily of the closing Mass was given by Cardinal Manuel Clemente, Patriarch of Lisbon. Lets stop here for a moment, and reread the last few lines again. The Church's support of Teams of Our Lady in these and many other countries is amazing! I found deep gratitude for their sustenance and backing. At the same time, I felt embarrassed and ashamed. The US only managed to have two priests attending the gathering. Encouraged by the close and symbiotic cooperation between the Movement and the church in these countries, we can have only one way forward, doubling our efforts to seek partnership with the Church in the US at all levels of her organization.

Let me close this reflection with a personal moment. During the Mass on Thursday and the following Night Vigil, I asked our Blessed Mother for help with my Rule-of-Life. Unknowingly to me at that moment, my request was granted. I noticed this only days later back in Oregon, that all my struggles with my Rule-of-Life were resolved. It is done. Paying attention to the Rule is not even on my mind anymore, it just 'is'. Naturally. Even to this day, I am still nourished by the blessing I received there. This was very much unexpected, since as some of you know, my faith is German Evangelic. But our Mother seems not to make any distinction there. Did she gave me a push into the right direction of my faith finding pursuit? I want to believe so.

I just wish everyone could have had a chance of similar experiences during the International Gathering in Fatima. But only few of us could attend. I hope, more of us will be able to travel to the next gathering in 2024. It is so much more than just a gathering. It is a life changing experience.

We had so many questions both about our ability to be effective and what was involved in this leadership position. While we have been in Teams for over 20 years and have said **yes** many times; from being Responsible Couple, Pilot Couple, Information Couple, and Sector Couple, we were now being asked to take on a big chunk of the Western US (Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Alaska, Wyoming and Montana). What's more is we would be following in the footsteps of Paul and Monique Harris, a really stellar Regional Couple who are leaving big shoes to fill.

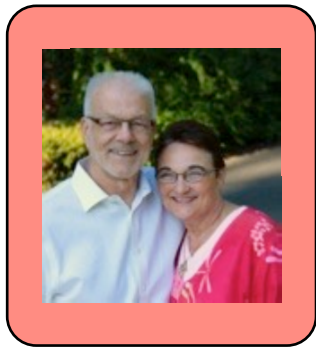

Portland Sector B Couple Update



An Oregon City 01 couple is thrilled to be meeting this coming week with their new pastor, Msgr John Cihak, at Christ the King, (CTK), in Milwaukie, OR to discuss creating a presence for Teams. Ten years ago CTK had two Teams which disbanded after a while. The thrilling aspect for meeting with Msgr Cihak is the fact he already knows about Teams-- and wants to help promote the Movement!

It's our "team retreat" time again in Redmond, OR, located on the other side of Mt. Hood. OC#1 Team will be meeting traveling once again to Redmond, OR to participate in their annual Team Retreat. This particular Team is unique in that they have been together for 10 full years with the full complement of 7 couples. When team members Barry & Penny Greig relocated to Redmond, they have maintained their fidelity to the Team by driving 3 hours to attend every monthly meeting. The other Team members soon decided to drive over to Redmond as a way to Thank You to the Greigs. The Team retreat is structured including using a printed Retreat booklet for writing down any personal insights, reflections, etc. The parts of the Retreat are timed, but not inflexible. Listed in the booklet is the entire weekend. Retreat schedule: presentation times, meal/snack times, singing, Saturday evening Mass, as well as daily free time for walks, biking, or napping. And each couple has previously signed up to prepare a complete meal (entree, sides, and dessert). Typically, the Greigs host dinner on Friday evening to welcome everyone yet the meal is under the format of a Team meeting. The focus of the Retreat is for the Team to discuss in further detail the study they would have completed from the previous year which runs from September through June. Each couple is assigned a chapter from the study in order to make an informal (though thorough) presentation to the Team, which is then followed by a group discussion and reflection. These discussions have proved to be revelatory. Some members have proven to be quite versatile in presenting material. 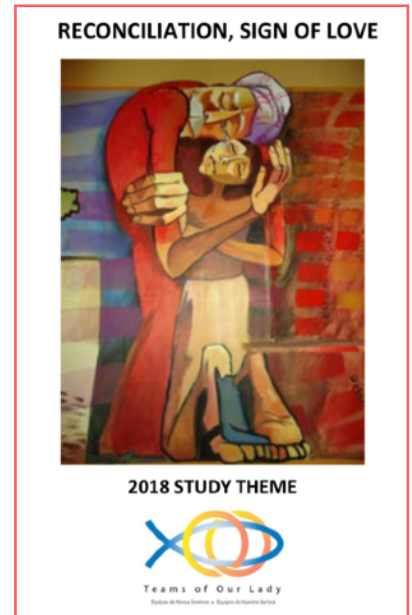

Additional reflections are taken from Pope John Paul II, Fr. Henri Caffarel, and a variety of church documents. The topic of these chapters covers:

- 3- Crisis, an opportunity for conversion
- 4- Focus on our fragility
- 5- Dealing with the pain of our shortcomings
- 6- Mercy and forgiveness, signs of love
- 7- Human justice vs Divine justice
- 8- Changing of order, thus a focus on joy
