#### Love is a raging river and we are small vessels.

Service and the Endeavors (Conjugal Prayer, Sit Down & Rule of Life)

A deep knowledge of Christ leads to the realization that we are loved intimately, deeply and intensely for who and what we are and for what we were created by God to be. This leads to our response to love God in return via worship and adoration as well as love His creation since we see His handprints in everything and everyone, especially our spouse. If we allow ourselves to be filled to overflowing with Christ's love we cannot help but allow love to spill over to our spouses, family, friends, parishes, and communities. This is the nature of service born by love. Mother Theresa says it well "If we pray we will believe; if we believe we will love; if we love, we will serve." Service is a chosen physical response to the inner realization of being blessed by love and gifted with unique talents.

Therefore if we are not feeling called to serve in our own unique way it may mean that we lack something in our intimacy with Christ. For us in Teams, our remedy for this feeling is the Endeavors. The practice of the Endeavors returns our focus to Christ and his gifts and unique calling for us. They help us to find or rediscover Christ's love for us.

The Endeavor, Conjugal Prayer, helps us grow closer to Christ and our spouse simultaneously. It can help us to see a physical gift of Christ in our lives while thanking him personally for the gift. Christ tells us "where two or more are gathered in my name, there I am in the midst of them". Conjugal Prayer can allow our realization of Christ to become more intense. When we bring our questions, uncertainties or doubts to Christ in this way we can assure that they are heard both from the verbalization of the one sharing and also the echo within our spouse's heart and mind.

The Endeavor, the Sit Down, is another way of increasing our awareness of Christ in our midst and may have a more singular focus. By excluding all else, setting aside time we can focus on what Christ may be saying by using four eyes, four ears, two minds and two hearts. This can be very effective at determining how the flow of love in our lives may have been reduced to a trickle. With some prayer, love and reflection, this flow of love can be restored.

The Endeavor, the Rule of Life, is deeply personal and is a test of our resolve. While scripture tells us "I can do all things through

Christ who strengthens me" the Rule of Life allows us to test this by stepping beyond what may seem possible if we allow Christ to be our source of strength and guidance. Even drips of water can create a hole in solid rock or a form a canyon through a mountain range given enough time. Patience, perseverance and God's grace are key to living the Rule of Life well. It is often best to start small because even small improvements taken consistently result in significant change over time.

We hope the testimonials within this edition of the Magnificat can show new ways to grow closer to Christ and express his love to the world. We send you our love that came first from Christ. Please pass it along.

### **Lenten Ideas For Families**

#### **Family Prayer**

As our children were growing up, we really tried to make family prayer time meaningful. I have developed various versions of this over the years, but we always started with making a rather large cross out of purple construction paper with the word LENT written across the top and placed it in a prominent place, for us it was on the dining room wall, where, after dinner we would often have our family prayer time. In a bowl on our prayer table under the cross, I would have a variety of different colored torn pieces of construction paper. As a family, we would select one piece of paper a day, tape it to the cross and work on that sacrifice or endeavor. On each piece of paper, I pre-wrote items that we could work on during Lent. Some items were:

Pray the Divine Mercy chaplet as a family

Na television



Spend 15 minutes in quiet family journal time

Be creative. When the children got older, I would ask them for input on these. Some I would repeat and we would do them several times throughout the 40 days.

A few times, instead of or in addition to the sacrifices, we would add names to the bowl and select one. We would put the name on gold crosses and that would be the person we would lift up in prayer for the day. This was always a blessed time as we remembered a variety of people in our lives.

I miss the days when our children were younger. If this can spur some creativity for

young Teams families, that is great! Children need to be in prayer with their families...so why not make it creative and meaningful?

#### "The decline in marriage is our most ignored national crisis..." – TIME Magazine, 2014

According to the Pew Research Center, "In 1970, about 70% of US adults were married. By 2018, that figure had fallen to 50%." Why is this a problem? Pope Francis wrote, "The welfare of the family is decisive for the future of the world and that of the Church" (Amoris Laetitia 31).

Marriage is good for the world. Married adults live longer and are healthier and happier. Children raised with both parents at home do better in school and have less addiction, teen pregnancy and trouble with the law. Poverty is almost non-existent for married couples; single motherhood is the greatest cause of poverty among women and children. According

to the National Marriage Project, husbands are happier when they are committed, generous and attentive to their wives, when they are open to children and when they practice a religious faith with their wife. Wives are happier when a spirit of generosity and commitment prevails in their marriage, when they nurture a family mentality and when they nurture friendships with others who take marriage, family and faith seriously.

Marriage is good for the Church. At Vatican II, the fathers of the council wrote in Gaudium et Spes, Joy and Hope, about how marriage and family make God's love present. "The Christian family manifests to all men the Savior's living presence in the world" (48). God's love is made present for spouses as they give themselves selflessly to each other in love. "Authentic married love is caught up into divine love...so that this love may lead the spouses to God... and in God they find the strength to carry on their role and responsibilities" (48). Parents are an image of God's love, not just teachers of his love. "They (parents) should realize that they are thereby cooperators with the love of God the Creator, and are so to speak, the interpreters of that love" (50).

Marriage is good for the world and for the Church. Marriage makes people better and it makes God's love present in the world. The decline of marriage is a real crisis. Our Movement which promotes Godly marriages is a light shining in the darkness. Thank you for your faithfulness in marriage. You are a sign of God's love in the world! Thank you. When you see something good in someone's marriage, tell them so.

#### Vierras fight COVID-19 with Prayer!

If one were to visit Dan Vierra at his rural home last fall, you would find a strapping strong man, busy at work on his property: Carrying lumber, building his shop, and doing things that strong men do. He is also a registered nurse at the local hospital, tending to surgery patients. Dan lives with his wife Debbie, son Wyatt and wife Aleta, and Debbie's mom Marilyn. Dan and Debbie have been members of Hanford Team 11 for over nine years.

Enter COVID-19 to their household on December 14th. First to Debbie, then to Wyatt and Aleta, then to Dan. (Marilyn escaped, immediately quarantining into her room.) As a nurse, Dan naturally tended to his very sick wife Debbie. Also, tending to his son Wyatt whose condition had him taken to the hospital by ambulance. Debbie, Wyatt and Aleta have recovered, but Dan fell ill soon after. By December 24, Dan's breathing became so labored he too was taken to the hospital by ambulance.

Enter Teams of Our Lady. Although Dan was unable to speak, Debbie prayed with him because he was able to hear. This couple prayer was a constant and so was the prayer support that Debbie received. Debbie would post Dan's progress on social media to update her prayer warriors. "We have been so grateful for the Power of Prayer," said Debbie, "So many people offered prayer, I have finally been able to turn Dan's healing completely over to God."

Their Team members came to Debbie's support by visiting her at home. Debbie said, "We prayed together and just being with them lifted my spirits!" She was also very grateful that her Sector provided some financial support when they learned that both Debbie and Dan lost income before assistance became available. Another Team member, a nurse in the same hospital, would give Debbie update calls when she had to be away. (Debbie has since returned to her work.)

Today (1/31/21) it's been 38 days in the hospital for Dan. In ICU for most of the time, he has been fighting for his life. Out of the ICU now, but still in the hospital, Dan is breathing through a tracheotomy ventilator. Dan is determined to continue to heal, and Debbie has been at his side the whole way. It will be a slow process to recovery, but day by day both prayer and support will keep Dan fighting! Please keep both Debbie and Dan, and all COVID-19 patients, in your prayers!

#### 4 Teams 5 times in 43 years!

Professional moves led to Pittsburgh 1 in the '90s, Oklahoma City 1 in the '00s, and grandparent-hood resulted in Drexel Hill 1 (Philadelphia) in the '10s. Each time we were a founding couple. Twice we left for family moves and twice the Team dissolved, as members aged or their toddlers reached boisterous childhoods.

So, why do we keep coming back to Teams? It is because of the people (epitomized by the late Andy and Loretta Favret) and the discipline of holy togetherness. We discovered the spirituality in people whom we might never have engaged with, but for the grace of Teams. Each taught us something, like visualizing Gospel readings in a person and seeing snippets of stress in marriage. Once, when a young groom said, "Sometimes I think she doesn't listen to me," a husband in his 70s echoed the same! We captured memories of wonderful priests, Trinitarians, Diocesans, Mercedarians, and a Nigerian missionary. Teams' endeavors endured, a real blessing, especially the unique sit-down, for bumps in the road. For all the harm COVID-19 has wrought, it made Teams possible for us again. With just one couple in Bethesda, members had been driving over an hour for meetings. When the virus soared, they went virtual, and two original couples invited us back by Zoom. The place they made for us was on a screen, with no table nor meal, sad to say. But still present are other core elements of highs and lows, liturgy, endeavors, and discussions that are, we learned for the fifth time, the heart of a Team. Do you hear how grateful we are? Thanks, Teams of Our Lady.
